Frequently Asked Questions:

1. What does 'Open Access' mean? Why is it better?

In this case, Open Access means that a digital copy of your book will be made available online for free to anyone who wants to read it under a Creative Commons licence. Your book will still be published in other formats that people will need to pay for.

This means that if people are interested in your book they will be able to read it, regardless of whether they have access to a well-funded library or can afford to pay for a personal copy.

Open Access digital versions will have an especially important impact on research communities in the developing world, where libraries are not well resourced and where readers find it difficult to afford other formats. It will also make it possible for people outside universities to read many books that are currently very expensive and sometimes hard to get hold of.

Finally, many authors whose work has been made Open Access have found that the freely available digital copy makes it easier for the right readers to find their book. This can have a positive impact on sales of the book in other formats, as researchers request that their libraries purchase a physical copy, buy a copy for themselves or decide that it would be more convenient to purchase a tailored e-reader version than to stick with an Open Access flat PDF or HTML version.

2. Will I still need to sign a contract with a publisher?

Yes. Knowledge Unlatched will not change the relationship that you have with your publisher.

You will still need to convince a publisher to publish your book and you will still need to negotiate the terms of your contract with them

3. Will I still get royalties if my book does well?

You will still receive royalties from the sale of your book, if your book contract provides for them.

Although a digital version will be made available to anyone for free, the publisher will continue to

sell physical copies and premium digital versions. You will receive royalties arising from these sales.

The Open Access version has the potential to act as a kind of advertising for the other versions of your book and to raise your book's profile in a digital world. Books that are made available on Open Access licences often sell better than their traditional equivalents.

4. Does this mean that other people will be able to make money from or change my work without my permission?

No, it doesn't. Knowledge Unlatched books will generally be made available under a Creative Commons, Non-Commercial Licence. This type of Open Access licence allows people to share your book, but does not allow them to use the Open Access version to make money or to alter the work without the copyright owner's permission. 5. How can I get my book published through Knowledge Unlatched?

Knowledge Unlatched is not a publisher. We are coordinating a global library consortium that will make it possible for libraries to 'unlatch' books (make them Open Access) when they choose to purchase them. In order to be part of the Knowledge Unlatched programme, your publisher will need to make your book available to the Knowledge Unlatched consortium. This is something that you should raise with your publisher. Let them know that you would like your book to be part of the Knowledge Unlatched programme!
